The 2008 New Zealand General Election: Provisional Results

18 November 2008

Parliamentary Library Research Paper

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- ▶ This paper provides a summary of the New Zealand General Election of 8th November, based on provisional (unofficial) results released by the Chief Electoral Office. Final (official) results are due by 22nd November and will be summarised in a subsequent paper to be published by the Parliamentary Library.
- ▶ The election night results produced an overhang of 2 seats making a total of 122 seats in the House. This was due to the Maori Party obtaining 2.2% of the party vote, but winning 5 electorate seats.
- ▶ The National Party won 45.5% of the party vote (39.1% in 2005) and 59 seats – a plurality of the party vote, but not an outright majority of the seats necessary to secure the confidence and supply of the House of Representatives (62 seats).
- ▶ The Labour Party won 33.8% of the party vote (41.1% in 2005) entitling it to 43 seats in the House – a decrease of 7 seats on its 2005 final election total of 50.
- ▶ The Green Party won 6.4% of the party vote (5.3% in 2005) and 8 seats in the House – an increase of 2 seats on its 2005 total of 6.
- ▶ ACT New Zealand won 3.7% of the party vote (1.5% in 2005) and 5 seats in the House – an increase of 3 seats on its 2005 total of 2.
- ▶ The Maori Party won 2.2% of the party vote (2.1% in 2005) and 5 seats in the House – an increase of 1 seat on its 2005 total of 4.
- ▶ Jim Anderton's Progressive won 0.9% of the party vote (1.2% in 2005) and retained the electorate seat of Wigram – similar to its results in 2005.
- ▶ The United Future Party won 0.9% of the party vote (2.7% in 2005) and retained the electorate seat of Ōhāriu – a decrease of 2 seats on its 2005 total of 3.
- ▶ The New Zealand First Party won 4.2% of the party vote (5.7% in 2005) and 0 seats in the House, compared to its 2005 total of 7 seats.
- ▶ The provisional turnout rate for the 2008 election was 78%, somewhat below the 81% turnout for the 2005 election.

Provisional Results

The figures used in this paper are based on the preliminary (unofficial) 2.1 million votes counted on election night and the results released by the Chief Electoral Office. There are an estimated 240,000 special declaration votes (10% of total votes) still to be counted, including an estimated 32,000 overseas votes. There were a number of close electorate votes on election night, where special votes may alter the final outcome. These seats include New Plymouth (314 vote majority to National), Waimakariri (518 vote majority to Labour), Rimutaka (625 vote majority to Labour), and Te Tai Tonga (684 vote majority to the Māori Party). Appendix 2 gives details for all 70 electorate seats with provisional (election night) majorities in electorate votes. Final (official) results are due by Saturday 22nd November 2008.

The General Election of 8th November was New Zealand's 49th since general elections began in 1853. The 49th Parliament comprises seven political parties and a provisional 122 members of Parliament – 70 members elected as electorate representatives and 52 members elected as list representatives. An overhang of two seats has been created by the Māori Party winning five of the seven Māori electorates – it would otherwise have been entitled to three seats based on its share of the party vote.

Table 1 shows that of the 107 MPs from the 48th Parliament who contested the 2008 election, 20 failed to win re-election as either an electorate or list MP: 10 Labour Party, 7 New Zealand First, 1 United Future, 1 Kiwi Party, 1 New Zealand Pacific Party. Of the 122 MPs in the 49th Parliament, 87 are returning members and 35 are new members of Parliament. Of the new MPs, 14 are electorate MPs and 21 are list MPs. There are 16 new National Party MPs (8 electorate, 8 list), 13 new Labour Party MPs (5 electorate, 8 list), 3 new ACT MPs (3 list), 2 new Green MPs (2 list), and 1 new Maori Party MP (1 electorate).

Table 2 shows that the National Party won a plurality of the party votes (45.45%), a majority of the electorate seats (41 out of 70), and a plurality of the total seats (59 seats out of 122, or a 48.4% share of the total seats). The Labour Party won 33.77% of the party votes and 43 seats in total (35.2% of the total seats), the Green Party won 6.43% of the party vote and 8 seats (6.6% of total seats), the ACT Party won 3.72% of the party votes and 5 seats (4.1% of total seats), the Maori Party won 2.24% of the party vote and 5 electorate seats (4.1% of total seats), Jim Anderton's Progressive won 0.93% of the party vote and 1 electorate seat (0.82% of total seats), and United Future New Zealand won 0.89% of the party votes and 1 electorate seat (0.82% of total seats).

Of the 70 electorate seats contested, 59 were won on election night by the incumbent MP, 10 changed parties and the National Party won the new electorate of Botany. The National Party gained 9 electorates previously held by the Labour Party (Auckland Central, Hamilton West, Maungakiekie, New Plymouth, Ōtaki, Rotorua, Taupō, Waitakere, and West Coast-Tasman). The Maori Party gained 1 electorate previously held by the Labour Party, Te Tai Tonga.

In total, the Maori Party won 5 electorate seats. Co-leaders Tariana Turia and Pita Sharples were returned for Te Tai Hauāuru and Tamaki Makaurau respectively. Also returned was Te Ururoa Flavell for Waiariki and Hone Harawira for Te Tai Tokerau. They were joined by Rahui Katene who won Te Tai Tonga. However, because the Maori Party's share of the party vote was 2.24%, it gains no list MPs and creates an overhang of 2 seats in Parliament.

ACT leader Rodney Hide was re-elected to the Epsom seat with an election night majority of 11,813 votes. This means ACT is entitled to 5 seats in total, based on ACT's 3.72% share of the party vote.

Jim Anderton's Progressive leader, the Hon Jim Anderton, was re-elected in the electorate seat of Wigram with a majority of 4,566. The party received 0.93% of the party vote, entitling the party to a total of 1 seat in the House.

United Future New Zealand leader, the Hon Peter Dunne, was re-elected in the electorate seat of Ōhāriu with a majority of 1,170. The party received 0.89% of the party vote, entitling the party to a total of 1 seat in the House.

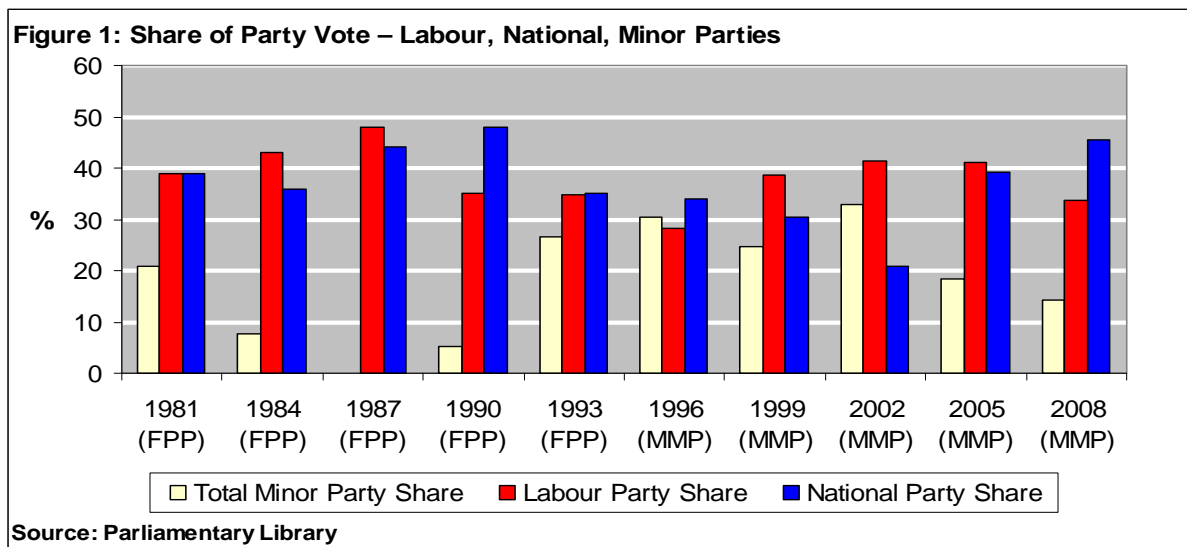
New Zealand First (4.21% of the party vote), the Kiwi Party (0.56%), and the New Zealand Pacific Party (0.33%) did not win any electorate seats and did not receive enough party votes to cross the 5% threshold of party votes necessary to be entitled to seats in the House.

Compared with the 2005 election, the National, Green, ACT, and Maori parties increased both their share of the party vote and their total seats, while the Labour, United Future, and New Zealand First parties saw both a decrease in their share of the party vote and their seats in the House (Table 3). The National Party increased its party vote by 6.4 percentage points above its 2005 election result and gained 11 seats, the Green Party gained 1.1 percentage points and two seats, ACT gained 2.2 percentage points and 3 seats, and the Māori Party gained 0.1 percentage points and 1 seat. The Labour Party lost 7.3 percentage points and 7 seats, United Future lost 1.8 percentage points and 2 seats, and New Zealand First lost just 1.5 percentage points but all 7 of its parliamentary seats. Jim Anderton's Progressive lost 0.2 percentage points from 2005, but retained its 1 seat in Parliament.

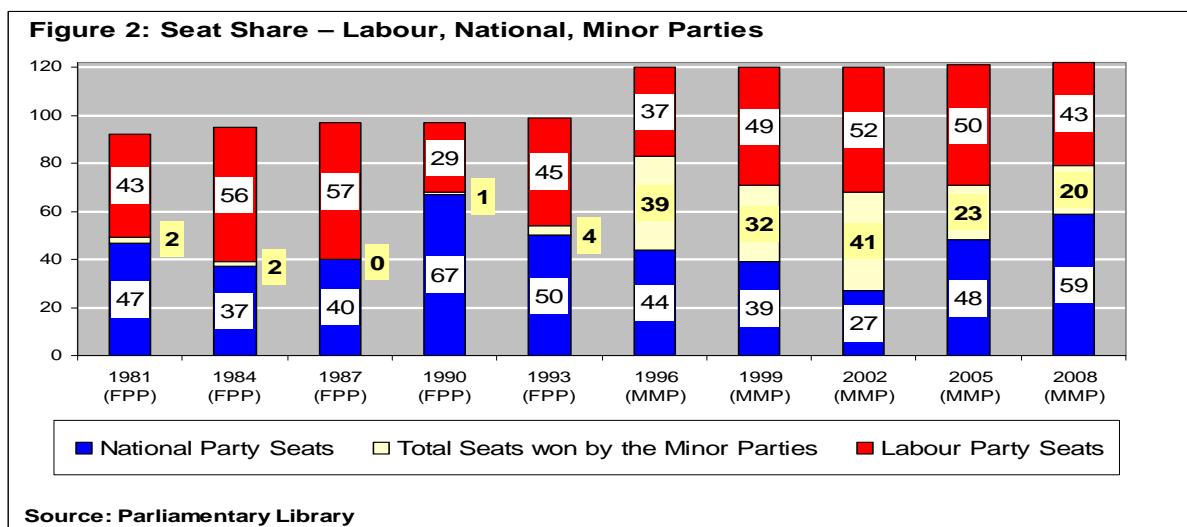
Party Vote Share and Seats in Elections 1981-2008

Under First-Past-the-Post (FPP) elections, from 1981 to 1993, the National Party averaged 40.3% of the vote while the Labour Party averaged 40.0%. Under Mixed Member Proportional (MMP) elections, from 1996 to 2008, the National Party averaged 34.0% of the party vote compared to a 36.6% average for the Labour Party. Figure 1 shows that the National Party's share of the party vote in 2008 (45.5%) is the highest it has achieved under MMP and is surpassed only by its 1990 election result when it achieved 47.8%. The Labour Party's share of the vote in 2008 (33.8%) is the lowest it has achieved under MMP since 1996 when it achieved 28.2%.

The vote share for the minor parties gaining representation in Parliament has doubled under MMP compared to FPP elections – from an average 12% over the FPP elections from 1981 to 1993 to an average 24% under MMP elections from 1996 to 2008. The five minor parties gaining parliamentary representation in 2008 gained a total 14.2% share of the party vote – the lowest share of any MMP election to date (see Figure 1).



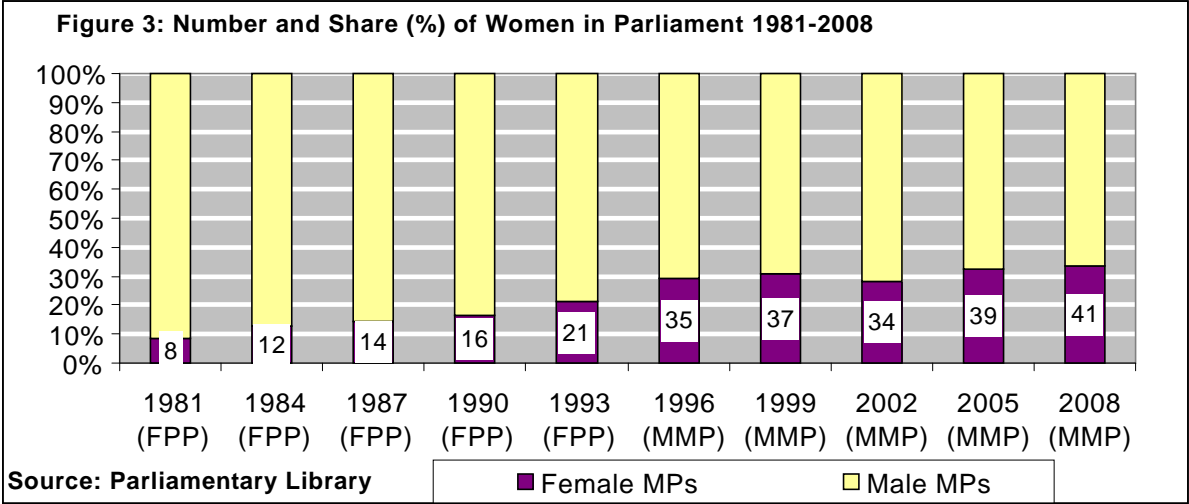
Under First-Past-the-Post elections, from 1981 to 1993, an average 98% of the seats in Parliament were won by the two main parties – Labour and National – from a combined average of 80% of the vote. In MMP elections between 1996 and 2008, Labour and National won a combined average of 74% of the seats from a combined average of 70% of the vote. In the 2008 election, these two main parties won 102 seats between them (84% of the seats) from 79% of the vote (see Figure 2).



Minor parties that gained parliamentary representation under FPP elections from 1981 to 1993 averaged about 2% of the seats from an average 12% of the vote. In MMP elections, from 1996 to 2008, minor parties that gained parliamentary representation won a combined average of 26% of the seats from 24% of the vote. In the 2008 election, the minor parliamentary parties won 20 of the 122 seats (16%) – the lowest number of seats and the lowest share of seats in any MMP election to date (see Figure 2).

Demographic Makeup of the 49th Parliament

There are a record 41 women MPs in the 49th Parliament, compared with the 39 elected to the previous Parliament (see Figure 3). Overall, women comprise 34% of the new Parliament, the highest proportion of any New Zealand Parliament. The National Party has 17 women MPs (29% of its total MPs), the Labour Party has 16 (37%), the Green Party has 5 (63%), ACT has 1 (20%), the Māori Party has 2 (40%), and Jim Anderton's Progressive and United Future have none. The new Parliament has 11 new women MPs: 5 National, 4 Labour, 1 Green, and 1 Māori Party.



The new Parliament has 18 MPs who identify as being of Maori descent, compared with 21 in the previous Parliament. Overall, MPs who identify as being of Māori descent comprise 15% of the Parliament, which compares to the 18% of the population identifying as being of Maori descent in the 2006 census. The National Party has 5 MPs who identify as being of Māori descent (8% of its total MPs), the Labour Party has 7 (16%), the Green Party has 1 (13%), the Māori Party has 5 (100%), and ACT, Jim Anderton's Progressive, and United Future have none. The 49th Parliament has 4 new MPs who identify as being of Māori descent: 2 National, 1 Labour, and 1 Māori Party.

The new Parliament has 5 MPs who identify as being of Pacific Peoples ethnicity, compared with 3 in the previous Parliament. Overall, MPs who identify as being of Pacific Peoples ethnicity comprise 4% of the Parliament, which compares to the 7% of the population who identified as being of the Pacific Peoples ethnic group in the 2006 census. The National Party has 1 MP who identifies as being of Pacific Peoples ethnicity (1.7% of its total MPs), the Labour Party has 4 (9%), and the Green Party, the Māori Party, ACT, Jim Anderton's Progressive, and United Future have none. The 49th Parliament has 2 new MPs who identify as being of Pacific Peoples ethnicity: 1 National, 1 Labour.

The new Parliament has 6 MPs who identify as being of Asian ethnicity, compared with 2 in the previous Parliament. Overall, MPs who identify as being of Asian ethnicity comprise 5% of the Parliament, which compares to the 9% of the population who identified as being of the Asian ethnic group in the 2006 census. The National Party has 3 MPs who identify as being of Asian ethnicity (5% of its total MPs), the Labour Party has 3 (7%), and the Green Party, the Māori Party, ACT, Jim Anderton's Progressive, and United Future have none. The 49th Parliament has 4 new MPs who identify as being of Asian ethnicity: 2 National, 2 Labour.

Voter Enrolment and Turnout

A total of 2.99 million people were enrolled to vote in New Zealand's general election, or 95.3 percent of the estimated eligible voting population – one of the highest enrolment rates in the world. This is a record and compares to the 95.2 percent who were enrolled in 2005.

A total of 405,430 voters of Maori descent were enrolled – 57% (229,666) were enrolled on the Maori roll and 43% (175,764) were enrolled on the general roll. There were 59,667 voters enrolled with an overseas postal address compared to the 43,535 who were enrolled in 2005.

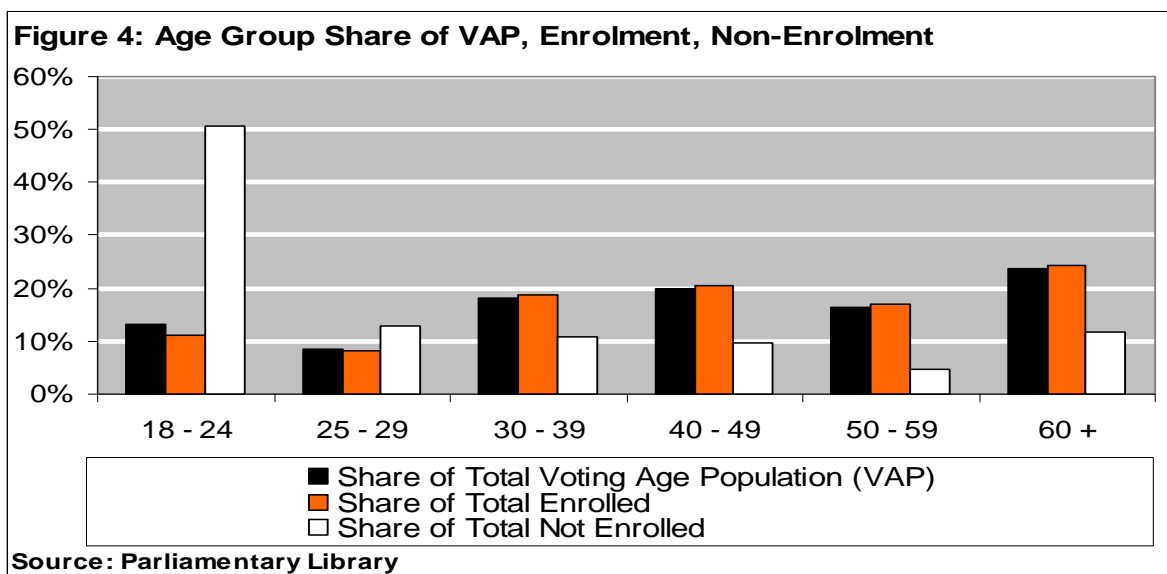
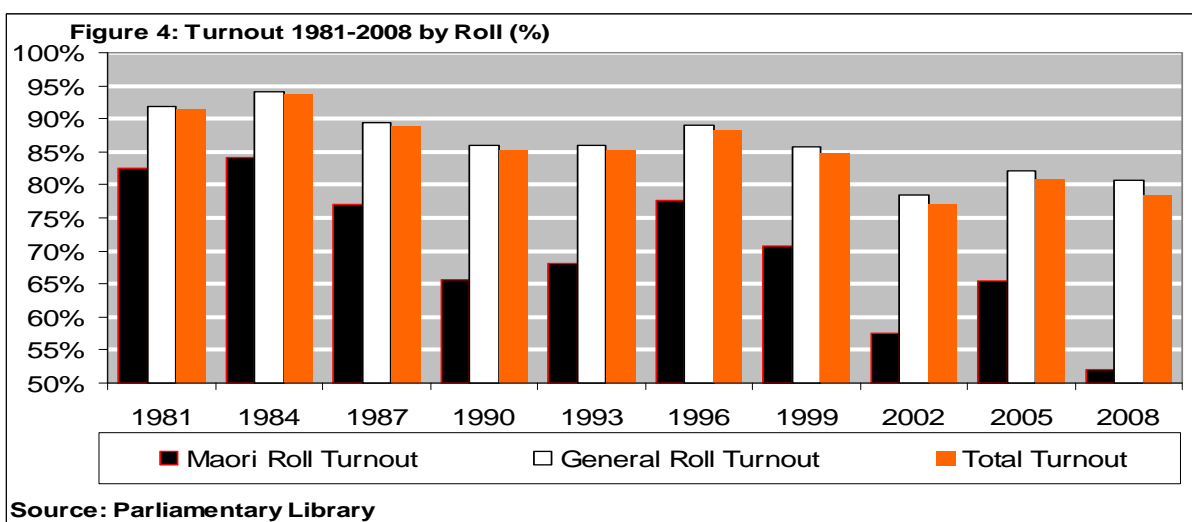


Figure 4 shows that voter turnout (party votes cast as a proportion of enrolled electors) for the 2008 General Election is a provisional 78.4% overall. This compares with the final 80.9% overall turnout of those enrolled in 2005 and the turnout of 77% in 2002. In FPP elections from 1981 to 1993, the average overall turnout was 89% while in MMP elections from 1996 to 2008 the average overall turnout was 82%.

However, differences in enrolment by age group can be noted. Figure 4 shows, for example, that while eligible voters aged 18-24 years represent 13% of the total voting age population (VAP), this age group accounts for over 50% of the total eligible voters who were not enrolled in 2008. By contrast, voters aged 60 plus represent 24% of total eligible voters but just 12% of the total not enrolled.

Voter turnout of those on the Maori roll generally falls below that of those on the general roll. In the 2008 election the estimated turnout rate (based on the provisional party vote count) of those on the Maori roll was 52%, while those on the general roll had a turnout rate of 81% (Figure 4 below). This compares with the final 65% turnout of those enrolled on the Māori roll in 2005 and the Māori roll turnout of 58% in 2002. In FPP elections from 1981 to 1993, the average turnout of those on the Māori roll was 76% while in MMP elections from 1996 to 2008 the average turnout of those on the Māori roll was 65%. The 2008 Māori roll turnout is (provisionally) the lowest of any election since 1981.
