## NOTICES OF MOTION

### GOVERNMENT

1. Hon GERRY BROWNLEE to move, That the following procedures be adopted:

#### **Definitions**

- 1 The following definition of “New Zealand court” be adopted as a sessional order:

New Zealand court means the Supreme Court, the Court of Appeal, the High Court, or a District Court; or any of the following specialist courts: the Court Martial of New Zealand established under section 8 of the Court Martial Act 2007, the Court Martial Appeal Court constituted by the Court Martial Appeals Act 1953, the Employment Court, the Environment Court, the Maori Appellate Court, and the Maori Land Court.

*(Standing Order 3 is to be read accordingly.)*

#### **Matters awaiting judicial decision**

- 2 Standing Order 111 be suspended, and the following new Standing Order be adopted as a sessional order:

##### **111 Matters awaiting judicial decision**

- (1) Matters awaiting or under adjudication in any New Zealand court may not be referred to in any motion, debate, or question, including a supplementary question, subject always to the discretion of the Speaker and to the right of the House to deal with legislation on any matter or to discuss delegated legislation.
- (2) Before referring to the matter in the House, a member must apply to the Speaker for the exercise of the Speaker’s discretion under (1).
- (3) In exercising his or her discretion, the Speaker:
  - (a) balances the privilege of freedom of speech against the public interest in maintaining confidence in the judicial resolution of disputes; and
  - (b) takes into account the constitutional relationship of mutual respect that exists between the legislative and judicial branches of government, and the risk of prejudicing a matter awaiting or under adjudication in any New Zealand court, including one awaiting sentencing.
- (4) Paragraphs (1) to (3) apply to any matter awaiting or under adjudication in any appeal to the Privy Council in existing proceedings, provided for by law.

#### **Return of evidence**

- 3 Standing Order 212 be suspended and the following new Standing Order be adopted as a sessional order:

##### **212 Return of evidence**

A select committee may return, or expunge from any transcript of proceedings, any evidence or statement that it considers to be irrelevant to its proceedings, offensive, possibly defamatory, or suppressed by an order of a New Zealand court.

### Examples of contempts

- 4 The following paragraphs be adopted as sessional orders:
- (x) as a member, in any motion, debate, or question (including a supplementary question), knowingly makes reference to a matter that is suppressed by an order of a New Zealand court, contrary to Standing Orders:
  - (y) in any evidence or advice provided to a committee, either written or oral, knowingly makes reference to a matter that is suppressed by an order of a New Zealand court, contrary to Standing Orders:
  - (z) as a member, during a meeting of a select committee, knowingly makes reference to a matter that is suppressed by an order of a New Zealand court, contrary to Standing Orders.

2. Hon GERRY BROWNLEE to move, That the following sessional order be adopted:

Standing Order 43 is to be read subject to this new order:

#### **Extension of Wednesday sitting**

- (1) If the Government has advised the Business Committee of its intention to move on a Wednesday, on which Government orders of the day take precedence, for the extension of the sitting for the purpose of considering Government orders of the day as arranged on the Order Paper, the House may order that the sitting be extended.
- (2) Whenever a Wednesday sitting is extended, the sitting is suspended between 10.00 pm and 9.00 am on the following Thursday, and at 1.00 pm or, in committee, five minutes before 1.00 pm on the following Thursday the proceedings are interrupted as provided for in Standing Orders 49 and 50 respectively.
- (3) A motion to extend a Wednesday sitting for the purpose of considering Government orders of the day as arranged on the Order Paper may be moved, without notice, by a Minister at any time after general business on a Wednesday, but not so as to interrupt a debate. There is no amendment or debate on the question that the sitting be extended.
- (4) Select committees may meet during an extended sitting of the House on a Thursday morning despite Standing Order 190(1)(b).
